CITY CHARACTER

Every city has a unique story to tell, and we're about to showcase what makes Charlotte one of a kind.

Charlotte may look like a brand new city with contemporary skyscrapers, but it's a place rich in history. It was the first city to separate from Great Britain, with Charlotte leaders supposedly signing the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence on May 20, 1775. Then in 1799, it was home to the nation's first gold rush.

Today, living in Charlotte means enjoying all the amenities of a big city—arts, culture, cuisine, and sports - sans all the hustle and bustle. In fact, it's a pretty chill place where most folks don't feel the need to always be in a hurry. Not to mention, y'all still comes up in conversations.



POPULATION PREDICTIONS

Located in Mecklenburg County, Charlotte is the largest city in North Carolina, with an estimated population of 872,500 as of 2018. The 10-county Charlotte metropolitan area has approximately 2.4 million residents, with the potential to reach 2.8 million by 2025.



ROYAL BEGINNINGS

European settlers founded Charlotte in 1768—a time when King George III ruled the Colonies. He named the city after his wife, Queen Charlotte, and gave the surrounding county the name Mecklenburg in honor of her birthplace in Germany. This is how Charlotte got the

Queen City nickname.

COST OF LIVING


Before moving to a new city, it's important to have an idea of how much it costs to live there. As of 2019, Charlotte has a cost of living that is 1.1% lower than the U.S. average.

When comparing cities of similar populations, we found that:

- Fort Worth is 0.9% more expensive than Charlotte.
- Indianapolis is 15.6% cheaper than Charlotte.
- Jacksonville is 5.5% cheaper than Charlotte.
- San Francisco is 172.3% more expensive than Charlotte.
- Seattle is 74.2% more expensive than Charlotte.







A cost of living index number below 100 means the city is cheaper than the national average, while a number above 100 means the city is more expensive.

LOCAL ECONOMY

Following the gold rush, Charlotte took off as a railroad junction and cotton mill hub by the late 1800s. Today, Charlotte is a major financial center, with the second-most banking assets after New York City. It has also become "The New Energy Capital," with more than 240 companies directly tied to the energy sector operating throughout the region.

HEALTHCARE SECTOR

While banking and energy may be Charlotte's primary industry segments, healthcare is a significant contributor to the local economy.

As of 2017, the sector has a \$13.4 billion total impact on the Charlotte economy. In fact, healthcare accounts for 1 in 10 jobs. with registered nurses being the area's top healthcare occupation.

Atrium Health and Novant Health are the two major hospital systems in the area, employing 35,700 and 12,468 workers, respectively.





THE LIGHT FACTORY

From hosting signature events to presenting curated exhibitions, this museum is a haven for photography and film developed by emerging and established artists. lightfactory.org



LOCAL ODDITY

Roosting outside the Bechtler Museum, you'll find a 17-foot avian adorned with more than 7,500 pieces of colored glass. Created by Niki de Saint Phalle, the Firebird sculpture has become a local landmark, with some referring to it as "majestic" and others calling it "the disco chicken."

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

Hushpuppies, hominy grits, barbeque, and tea are among the top food and drink staples in Charlotte. Just know that barbeque and tea take on a different persona in the South. Unless otherwise noted, barbeque refers to pulled pork and tea refers to sweet tea.

HISTORIC HAPPENINGS

Having made the transition from the Old South (pre-Civil War) to the New South (post-Civil War), you'll find Charlotte has a unique, diverse history that runs deep.



THE HORNET'S NEST

During the Revolutionary War, as the Redcoats marched north under frequent, persistent attacks from local militia, a British officer dubbed the Charlotte area "a hornet's nest of rebellion."

Today, a hornet's nest remains a prominent city symbol, showing up on the Charlotte-Mecklenburg Police Department seal and serving as the inspiration behind the city's NBA team name.

LEVINE MUSEUM OF THE NEW SOUTH

Home to the award-winning exhibit Cotton Fields to Skyscrapers, the museum serves to connect people through history, culture, and celebration. museumofthenewsouth.org

REED GOLD MINE

As the site of the nation's first documented gold discovery (a 17-pound nugget), the museum showcases what life was like during the gold rush. It also offers tours of the restored mine tunnels, and from April through October, visitors have the opportunity to pan for gold. historicsites.nc.gov

THE CHARLOTTE MUSEUM **OF HISTORY**

As the steward of the Hezekiah Alexander House, the oldest surviving home in Mecklenburg County, the museum focuses on the settlement of the Carolina Backcountry and the ideas and events that led to the American Revolution. charlottemuseum.org









TRAVEL MODES

While most of the Charlotte area

is car-dependent, the community is making strides in creating a cohesive regional transit system. However, there are pockets within the city where you can get where you need to go without a car. Walkable neighborhoods such as Dilworth, NoDa and South End are among those well-served by public transportation.
